
#### IPSK is using storytelling to Improve Pain in SK!

#### **Regina Working Group Update – Book and Curriculum Project**

The Regina IPSK team continues working on the book and curriculum project focusing on pediatric pain. Members of the team met with an editor and are expecting final edits to the book later this month. An illustrator has been recruited who will then create a story board and will meet with the Regina team to discuss and review the draft images. The team will then bring this all back to some of the original research participants for their review and feedback. Development of the curriculum manual targeting grades 3/4 is also ongoing. #### Saskatoon Working Group Update - Graphic Medicine Project

Saskatoon's IPSK team has completed data analysis for 3 of the 4 graphic medicine stories. These stories will be situated in 4 different healthcare settings: the emergency department, a family physician's office, the surgical ward of a hospital, and an addictions treatment center. The full project team has met twice with Arcana Creative to conceptualize the episodes and visual elements for story 1 and 2 using the 3-act framework. We will meet with Arcana in March to continue this work. Drafts of all 4 stories are expected to be completed by May 2023. Feedback on the drafts will be collected in a second round of interviews and a focus group in the summer-fall of 2023.
